It became a community project!







Before the Eco Council worked on our flower and vegetable beds, the only things laid down in the soil were weeds, dead flowers and old bulbs - we could tell it needed improving. It was a mess. Everything in sight was untidy, disorganised and overgrown, that's why we decided to work on it.

The first thing we did was dig up the bulbs and weeds and turn over the soil so that we had a blank canvas to work on. We were very fortunate and lucky to have many flower and vegetable donations for us to work with. We then started the planting process...

We started planting vegetables like: carrots, lettuce, tomatoes, cucumber and peppers. We also planted some strawberries! All these fruits and vegetables are growing really well and some of the strawberries are ready to pick. We are all so glad with how they're turning out.

Once that was sorted, we started clearing up behind the bed. We moved the netball posts, buckets and brushes and cleaned the ground. It was now ready for the wormery! We got two plastic containers, stacked them on top of each other and drilled breathing holes and fertilising holes. Worms produce fertiliser called worm tea, if you spread this over plants, it helps them to grow quicker and better. The containers were half full of soil and had compost foods like our break time snacks: apple peels and banana skins. The whole of the inside and outside was covered in cardboard as worms love the dark; it's their natural habitat.

Our last step was to make a flower bed in memorial of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee 2022. Again, we were so fortunate to have so many donations of flowers in the colours of red, white and blue as these are the colours of the United Kingdom national flag. Our flowers included: Cosmos, Geranium, Begonia, Lobelia and many others. The impact this made on the flower bed was huge. The difference it made was unbelievable and was certainly a great touch to express to our nation.
